The Nina Haggerty Centre for the Arts is excited to have been accepted to the Container Art exhibition at this year's Capital Ex. Container Art features unique art installations in large shipping containers. Founded in Italy in 2005 by Ronald Lewis Facchinetti, Container Art has grown into a global network, featured at various events around the globe. Each container features a different work of contemporary art and a different mix of local and international artists at each event.

The Nina Haggerty Collective were recently introduced to figure drawing, working with a live model in the studios. Drawing from life proved to be challenging for most of the studio artists so, searching for ways to develop observational skills, the model's silhouette was projected onto large pieces of paper to generate images. Tracing multiple shadow poses and working together to add colour and content became a way to create successful work.

Les Demoiselles d'Edmonton was the exciting result. This series of figures, mounted on large pieces of plywood, create a disjointed and occasionally unnerving representation of the female model, evoking a sense or feeling reminiscent of Picasso's famous painting. The seated figure represent the idea of artist and an objectifying gaze.

Container Art will be on display in Hall E during Capital EX, July 22-31.
